Becoming a more Pastoral Church – Your Contribution?

In September we asked you to consider ways in which you could help us be a more pastoral church. Possibilities include giving lifts to church for those who have restricted mobility and no transport, which includes several elderly people in the community, and visiting people who are sick or bereaved, or who need to receive Communion at home due to poor mobility.

We received a small number of response forms, and are grateful to those who have offered to help in different ways. However, the response to date is nowhere near sufficient to meet the needs.

It may well be that you are reluctant to make a commitment that ties you down too much, or that you think you lack specialist skills. Let me reassure you that you will always be free to decide when and how often you will help, and that most pastoral work is simply about being friendly and caring. For those who'd like to improve their listening skills we will be running a two-session course in the New Year. This is open to everyone, whether or not you want to commit to visiting.

A new response form will be given out in December, and we hope very much that more people will offer to help. Our time is one of our most precious commodities, but even a few minutes having a friendly chat or picking someone up for church can make a difference to the recipient that is out of all proportion to the small sacrifice you have made.

Youth update

These are exciting times in Sandhurst Youth! First of all, from the beginning of December, we are launching a new youth club, 'Dream Big', open to all 11–18 year olds in Sandhurst. It will offer a wide variety of activities and opportunities to build friendships, and will run for 6.00–8.00pm each Sunday evening in the Pastoral Centre.

In the new year we will also be starting a mentoring scheme for young people aimed at helping them develop their confidence, character and skills to achieve their dreams for life.

Both these need your support and involvement, whether it be in the simple tasks of setting up on a Sunday, through to coming alongside some of our fantastic young people to share your life experience and learning, and encouraging them on their journey – please chat with Mike Gower about all these opportunities.

And corporately there is change too. We have an application in to the Charities Commission to make Sandhurst Youth an independent charity serving the young people community and the churches – we expect to complete the process before Christmas, and the PCC has already set up all the resolutions to enable the transfers etc to take place. We plan that over the coming years Sandhurst Youth will be a strategic resource supporting church and community youth work. It's a key example of how, as a church, we can become 'mission shaped' and facilitate real engagement outside the church. Treasurer's report for the 9 months Jan to Sept 2018

Each quarter I give a brief update of the church's general fund. The general fund is the key fund for the church's activities. All our donations and gifts go to this fund unless the donor very specifically asks for them to go to a restricted fund, such as WinSpire, Youth Worker, Family Worker, etc. All the running expenses of the church are paid from the general fund.

For the nine months January to September 2018 the actual results of the general fund are better in comparison with the same period last year. Our budget for 2018 is to break even so to have our income equal expenses.

As can be seen, income in 2018 is much better than last year. This is due to our collecting the tax we recover faster than last year. But, even taking this into account, we are slightly ahead of last year, however. So are expenses – so net we are pretty much the same but have given some of our charitable giving earlier.

toddler time is for everyone under school age and their carers. It's on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month from 9.00am to 11.00am in the Pastoral Centre (not school holidays). Come and join us for songs, craft activities, drinks and toast, a Bible story and prayers, and an opportunity for play (children) and chat (parents). NB – Dads also welcome!

Parish Communion (9.30 am). During term time, including half-term breaks, there are age-related activities in the Pastoral Centre for children aged three up to school year 5 every week, and for Year 6+ on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month. They should come to the Pastoral Centre by 9.25am to be registered, except on the 2nd Sunday of the month, when we all meet in church to take part in the beginning of the service. The group leaders bring the children into the church for the last part of the service every week. Our crèche is not currently running, but arrangements can be made at short notice to care for children under three years. Please ask one of the welcome team.

During the main school holidays children should come into the church with their parents at the beginning of the service, and will be invited to join a leader after a few minutes of the service to watch a Christian story based DVD in the Pastoral Centre. The group leaders bring the children into the church for the last part of the service. For young children staying in the service there are play-bags for them to enjoy – please ask one of the welcome team.

The Family Service is held on the first and third Sundays of the month, including school holidays. It is informal and child friendly, with action songs and an interactive talk, and is a place you really can come to with small children and not worry how they will behave! Refreshments are served in the church from 11.00am; worship begins at 11.15am and lasts about 45 minutes. Come and meet other families and make friends. We need help with refreshments and welcoming, so please email Kirsty Dunlop at kirsty@tcb-arrow.co.uk if you'd like to volunteer!

Windows Update

The west window is back! It was reinstalled by Salisbury Glass on 20th and 21st November. – photo on p16.

The window has been completely dismantled. Each pane has been carefully cleaned to the extent it can be without damaging the colour and the detail; specific heads and details have been enhanced, and the whole window has been re-assembled with new leading. It should now be good for the next 100 years.



Following the re-installation, a team of volunteers has made use of the scaffolding to put a fresh coat of emulsion on to the window surrounds, and above the window. The remainder of the wall will be done when the tower work is complete, as this includes fixing the leaks at the base of the tower.

The round window at the head of the North Aisle, and the lancet window from the tower will now undergo the same process, and we hope will be back in the new year.

Huge thanks to those who have contributed to WinSpire in so many ways to enable us to do this vital work.

The Children's Society

The Children's Society is the charity St Michael's regularly supports over Christmas – as it does this year.



We listen. We support. We act.

Right now in Britain there are children and young people who feel scared, unloved and unable to cope. The Children's Society works with these young people, step by step, for as long as it takes.

Cold, hungry and sleeping on the streets Amanda was a child in real danger – until a project worker from The Children's Society gave her the support she urgently needed. Amanda is now excited about Christmas for the very first time.

Sadly, there are so many children like Amanda who have never experienced a real Christmas. But by showing young people that they have hope and aren't alone, we can make this a Christmas full of hope and free from fear for vulnerable children across the country.

The Children's Society is a national charity that runs local services that help thousands of children and young people who desperately need our support. We also campaign to make sure laws are changed to make children's lives better. We work with some of the most vulnerable children and young people in this country who are facing terrible hardship, abuse and neglect.

Although the issues these children face are varied, the root problem is often the same – their needs are being ignored and their voices are going unheard.

For many children, having one of our project workers to talk to is the first time their voice has ever really been heard. Taking the time to listen to what children and young people say is what drives us to keep tackling the issues that prevent them from fulfilling their potential.

'[They] actually listened, there's nothing that someone needs more than someone will actually listen to them.'

During 2017/18

We directly reached 11,031 children and young people through our services and a further 13,492 through our awareness-raising work. 73 per cent of young people we worked with experienced positive changes

across key changes of their lives, including safety, relationship and mental health. We helped bring about 61 national and local policy changes, improving the lives of over 550.000 children.

There are no simple answers so we work with others to tackle complex problems. Only together can we make a difference to the lives of children now and in the future.

How you can help?

- Sign-up to join the new St Michael's A2C House Box Network. A2C means Advent (2nd Dec 2018) to Candlemas (6th Feb 2019). Basically the scheme is to get church members to take a 'house box' home on Advent Sunday to put in loose change and bring it back on Candlemas. The money will be used to make a big difference to children in need of help.
- Attend the Christingle Service and the celebrations to mark Christingle's 50th Birthday on Sunday 16th December 4.00 pm – particularly suitable for families with young children.
- Have fun Carol Singing around the streets Monday on 17th December, 6.30 pm (NB non-singing roles available).

How much do you care that local children should have a great education within the context of a church school? St Michael's School is a Church Voluntary-Aided School, which means that half of the governors are appointed by the church, on the recommendation of the rector. At the moment we have three vacancies and will have another one soon, and if you would be willing to offer your time and the expertise you have acquired through your work and life experience (not necessarily in education), we would be very pleased to hear from you.

Governors come from a wide range of backgrounds and bring a variety of skills. You would need to be available for about 3–4 meetings a term. Attendance at other school events, where possible, is also appreciated. There is no financial remuneration, but there is plenty of training available from Bracknell Forest Council and the diocese.

Giving – responding to God's call today

Two changes are afoot to make giving to St Michael's as easy and efficient as possible.

Firstly, those who give regularly are being asked to do so in future through the CofE 'Parish Giving Scheme'. This centralised direct-debit-based scheme will simplify our administration for gift aid, and also allows you to index link your giving. There is an information pack available at the back of church for all those who currently give regularly, or who would like to.

And for those who only give occasionally, and for visitors to the church, we shall shortly have in place a contactless-card—giving terminal – simply tap your credit or debit card on the machine and it will give £3, £5 (default) or £10 to the church. This is not intended to replace the opportunity to give through the plate in services, but as a convenience for those who do not carry much cash, as is the case with many visitors at weddings and baptisms.

If you would like more information on giving to the church, either regularly or occasionally, then do please speak with me. God loves a cheerful giver!

Spire loft clearance

On Saturday 17th November a band of willing helpers assembled to clear out a three-foot high mountain of twigs that the birds had brought in over the last four years through holes in the cedar shingles. The birds' aim is to build nests behind one of the holes but the twigs drop to the loft floor. This year they did have one nest built where two beams cross in the spire.

We used five rubber tubs which in turn were filled with crushed twigs, passed to the shelf below, lowered on a rope to the floor in the room where the clock is situated, and then taken down the stairs, tipped into one of the big dumpy bags, which when full were taken in a wheelbarrow and emptied in the churchyard garden material pile. It was a good team effort with everyone playing their part. At half time we tucked in to bacon rolls, hot cross buns, and coffee provided by our excellent hosts, Nicki and Cliff.

In all, we filled over 140 rubber tubs and Lyn on the stair run very generously said if she weren't doing that she would be at the gym!

If you don't want to be press ganged into a team to repeat this task in four years' time then buy a few shingles!
